Mayor Donovan opened the meeting at 7:10 p.m. with the Pledge of Allegiance led by Trustee Brazill.

MINUTES OF VILLAGE BOARD MEETING – NOVEMBER 15, 2010 A motion was made by Trustee Champagne and seconded by Trustee Christensen to accept the minutes of the November 15, 2010 Village Board Meeting as recorded. All in favor. Motion carried.

MINUTES OF SPECIAL MEETING – A motion was made by Trustee Christensen and seconded by Trustee Cronk to accept the minutes of the November 30, 2010 Special Meeting as recorded. All in favor. Motion carried.

A motion was made by Trustee Champagne and seconded by Trustee Brazill to accept the minutes of the December 6, 2010 Village Board Meeting as recorded. All in favor. Motion carried.

**ONONDAGA

Mayor Donovan said the agreement replaces the Sales Tax revenue that the Village had previously received. He said the agreement covers General Fund expenses for the administration, maintenance and repairs of current infrastructure, and potential infrastructure projects. Mayor Donovan said the agreement has been reviewed by village attorneys and the Onondaga County Mayors Association has approved the final agreement. Attorney Primo asked for clarification of the changes made and Mayor Donovan said the agreement was adjusted to include the cost of General Fund expenses and was not limited to new infrastructure projects. Mayor Donovan said that the Sales Tax revenue was previously used for the General Fund and the current agreement is approximately \$220,000 less than the Sales Tax previously received.

Trustee Brazill asked if they had adjusted the payment schedule and Mayor Donovan said the Sales Tax was previously paid quarterly and the new agreement is paid in two payments January and June, he said Onondaga County refused to consolidate the payment.

A motion was made by Trustee Champagne and seconded by Trustee Christensen empowering Mayor Donovan to sign the ten (10) year, January 1, 2011 – December 31, 2020, Village Infrastructure Improvement Agreement Program with Onondaga County and is attached hereto as Schedule "A". All in favor. Motion carried.

(GIGP)/UPDATE Mayor Donovan said the Local Match of 10% consists of in-kind services including administration, employee benefits, maintenance expenses and existing infrastructure.

MAYORS AGAINST ILLEGAL GUNS A motion was made by Trustee Champagne and seconded by Trustee Brazill empowering Mayor Donovan to sign Mayors Against Illegal Guns Statement of Principles and attached hereto as Schedule "B". All in favor. Motion carried.

AMBULANCE ***PATRICK HERRICK / OUT OF WORK NOTICE***
Mayor Donovan reported that Patrick Herrick, FT Paramedic, will be out of work on Workers' Compensation until January 31, 2011 per written notice from Dr. Ray T. Forbes, MD and dated December 14, 2010. The original date of injury was October 18, 2010.

FIRE DEPARTMENT ***REQUEST PERMISSION TO ATTEND ICE COLD WATER RESCUE CLASS***
A motion was made by Trustee Brazill and seconded by Trustee Champagne giving permission for Erich Schepp, Richard Wright, III, Peter J.M. Ferstler, Peter J. Ferstler, & Robert Becker, to attend the Ice Cold Water Rescue class offered by the NYS Academy of Fire Science, Montour Falls, NY, January 29-30, 2011, at a cost of \$96.00 per person. All in favor. Motion carried.

DPW ***HOLIDAY DPW HELP – JOSHUA MARKO***
A motion was made by Trustee Champagne and seconded by Trustee Christensen ratifying prior approval to authorize DPW Superintendent Petterelli to return summer DPW employee Joshua Marko to work on Tuesdays and Wednesdays to help with trash pick-up during the holiday season at his same summer hourly rate of \$9.00 per hour effective December 13, 2010. All in favor. Motion carried.

CERF Nothing to report.

TRUSTEES' REPORT Trustee Champagne had nothing to report.

Trustee Christensen had nothing to report.

Trustee Cronk reported that the DPW has been busy clearing snow. He said that the next Town of Manlius Police Committee meeting was scheduled for January 26, 2011.

Trustee Brazill said that the Critical Response Committee drill was rescheduled for Thursday, January 6, 2011 at 6:00 p.m. at Pine Grove Elementary School, with a 5:30 p.m. sign-in. Trustee Brazill reported that the Fire and Ambulance Rescue Services RFP Study is under way and there will be meetings scheduled throughout January and February to discuss the study.

MAYOR'S REPORT Mayor Donovan said the snowy weather conditions have been difficult, but the Minoa DPW has been diligent in their snow removal and thanked them for their hard work. He said that snow removal is a huge expense and municipalities across the state will be reducing their plowing to cut costs.

Mayor Donovan said he has been working with the NYCOM Mandate Relief Task Force Committee and displayed a sample of the report and suggested that the Board and audience

review the report entitled "You Can't Cap What You Can't Control" at <http://www.nycom.org> as it pertains to the proposed tax cap and unfunded mandates. Mayor Donovan said unfunded mandates are requirements from New York State and the Federal government that are funded at a local level without any contributions from those government bodies. He said the Task Force is attempting to meet with Governor Elect Cuomo to discuss the mandates and ask the Governor Elect to support their recommendations and reduce the financial burden on local municipalities. Mayor Donovan said that Mayors and Town Supervisors have no power as individuals and recommended that the audience members contact their representatives to support the NYCOM effort on the mandate relief. Mayor Donovan said that employee benefits and the NYS Retirement program will eventually consume the entire General Fund budget by 2014 and changes need to be made now.

Mayor Donovan said that Governor Elect Cuomo has recommended that New York State freeze all employee salary increases and NYCOM is requesting that it include all county, town and village employees as well. Mayor Donovan said the NYCOM Mandate Relief Task Force held press conferences throughout New York State the previous week in an effort to spread the word. Mayor Donovan said the reason for the salary freeze is to provide temporary relief, while the real cost drivers (mandates) are addressed by New York State.

ATTORNEY'S REPORT Nothing to report.

TREASURER'S REPORT – NOVEMBER 2010 A motion was made by Trustee Brazill and seconded by Trustee Christensen to accept the Treasurer's Report for the month of November 2010 as recorded. All in favor. Motion carried.

AUDIT CLAIMS A motion was made by Trustee Champagne and seconded by Trustee Brazill that claims on Abstract # 14 in the amounts of General Fund - \$72,863.94 (Vouchers 576-626); and Sewer Fund – \$20,262.79 (Vouchers 201-215) for a total of \$93,126.73 be audited and paid. All in favor. Motion carried.

PUBLIC COMMENTS John Sears said he has been attending the meeting for years and expects that he'll be the only person at the next meeting.

Mayor Donovan said that many people do not attend meetings at all levels and it is difficult to get residents interested in attending Board meetings and/or communicate with their State and Local representatives. He said the one comment he hears from Albany representatives is that they never hear from their constituents. Mayor Donovan encouraged the ESM High School students to vote, attend meetings and get involved with their communities, as they are the leaders of tomorrow.

Anderson Fish asked how meeting information was provided to the residents. Mayor Donovan said that meetings are advertised on the Village of Minoa website <http://www.villageofminoa.com>, newsletters, and legal notices. He said there aren't any assigned reporters outside of the City of Syracuse and if the Village needs information publicized we submit the news release and hope that it gets published. Mayor Donovan said the Village Board members are elected and work on a part-time basis without benefits and the majority of the members have full-time jobs.

John Sears described his history with attending Board meetings and said he became active when the Board decided to build the Municipal Building during only one meeting and he participated in the petition to put the building up for referendum. He said he was responsible for suggesting that the Village of Minoa provide minutes for the Minoa Library and the Village website, all because one person spoke up. Mayor Donovan said the construction of the Municipal Building was a ten year project and it did not occur at just one individual meeting.

EXECUTIVE SESSION – IN A motion was made by Trustee Brazill and seconded by Trustee Christensen to enter into Executive Session at 7:45 p.m to discuss the medical, financial, credit, or employment history of a particular person or corporation, or matters leading to the appointment, employment, promotion, demotion, discipline, suspension, dismissal or removal of a particular person or corporation and the proposed sale of real property owned by the Village. All in favor. Motion carried.

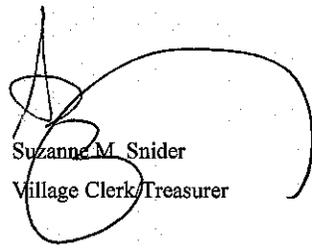
EXECUTIVE SESSION - OUT A motion was made by Trustee Brazill and seconded by Trustee Champagne to come out of Executive Session at 8:10 p.m. All in favor. Motion carried.

UNION NEGOTIATIONS Attorney Primo said that following the Section 75 Hearing for an Ambulance employee that was cancelled, he and Trustee Brazill met with Union President Michael Pfeiffer and Attorney Nathaniel Lambright to discuss Collective Bargaining Negotiations and the PERB grievance filed by Sharon Romer, former FT Paramedic. Attorney Primo said the Village had requested that verbiage be adjusted in the agreement to remove eight full-time bargaining unit members and allow for four (4) full-time Paramedics and four (4) full-time Emergency Medical Technicians with the option for the Paramedic Supervisor to be one of the full-time Paramedics with the ability to opt out as a bargaining unit member. Attorney Primo said they had previously agreed to a standard eight (8) hours holiday pay in a graduated scale for all full-time ambulance employees and Mr. Pfeiffer and Attorney Lambright requested twelve (12) hours holiday for employees who worked the holiday in exchange for the adjusted verbiage to allow for the Paramedic Supervisor option. Attorney Primo said the Village never received a written request from the Union and after a verbal discussion with Attorney Lambright on December 20, 2010, Attorney Primo agreed to present it to the Village Board for their review and discussion.

A motion was made by Trustee Brazill and seconded by Trustee Champagne authorizing the proposed verbiage to include the Paramedic Supervisor as one of the four (4) full-time Paramedics in the schedule rotation with the option to opt out as a bargaining unit member and the Village Board rejects the Union's request for additional holiday pay that was not previously negotiated and tentatively approved. All in favor. Motion carried.

ADJOURNMENT A motion was made by Trustee Champagne and seconded by Trustee Brazill that the Village Board Meeting be adjourned at 8:15 p.m. All in favor. Motion carried.

AGREEMENT

This Agreement, by and between the County of Onondaga, a municipal corporation of the State of New York, by its County Executive Joanne M. Mahoney ("County"), with offices located at 421 Montgomery Street, Syracuse NY, and the Village of Minoa, by its Mayor Richard Donovan ("Village"), with offices located at 240 North Main Street, Minoa, NY 13116.

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, by Resolution No. 84, adopted May 4, 2010, the Onondaga County Legislature authorized the County Executive to enter into agreements to provide financial assistance to the villages within Onondaga County for public improvements designed to enhance and promote regional growth; and

WHEREAS, the Village is duly authorized to enter into this Agreement; and

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of one dollar (\$1.00) payment waived, the County and the Village do mutually agree as follows:

TERM

The term of this Agreement shall be from the date of execution by both parties through December 31, 2020. This Agreement may be terminated by either party for cause at any time.

SCOPE

Commencing January 1, 2011 and continuing each year through December 31, 2020, the County hereby agrees to provide financial assistance to the Village for the construction and maintenance of public improvements ("Infrastructure Grant") pursuant to Resolution No. 84-2010 and subject to terms and conditions of this Agreement.

PAYMENT TERMS

i. Infrastructure Grant and Payment Schedule

The amount of the Infrastructure Grant paid to the Village shall be 5.51 percent of the total amount appropriated for such public improvements in the adopted annual county budget.

Infrastructure Grant payments shall be made in semi-annual equal installments on January 15 and July 15 of each calendar year, with the first payment to be made January 15, 2011, subject to the terms and conditions contained herein. Infrastructure Grant payments shall be used only for approved Infrastructure Projects as provided for herein.

In the event that the Village is abolished, dissolved or otherwise terminated during the course of this Agreement, the Village shall transfer to the Town(s) in which such Village is located any Infrastructure Grant funds accumulated and not yet encumbered or expended, provided that such Town(s) enters into an intermunicipal agreement with the County to complete and pursue projects previously approved under this Agreement. If the Town and County fail to execute such intermunicipal agreement, then the County shall so notify the Village and the Village shall transfer back immediately to the County any Infrastructure Grant funds accumulated and not yet encumbered or expended. On December 1, 2020 or upon early termination of this Agreement as provided for herein, the Village shall transfer back to the County any Infrastructure Grant funds accumulated and not yet encumbered or expended.

ii. Infrastructure Projects

a. Purpose of Grant

The Infrastructure Grant is provi

lage in paying expenses or

undertaking work for the administration, maintenance, repair, replacement and improvement to/of existing or new public infrastructure and facilities that enhance and promote regional growth; reduce undesirable sprawl; encompass green technology; and/or promote sustainable growth ("Infrastructure Projects").

b. Infrastructure Project Plans: Approval Process

The Village shall submit annually proposed Infrastructure Plans for the ensuing calendar year on forms provided by the County to the County Executive, or her designee, with the first of such plans to be submitted on or before January 1, 2011. Said plans shall include a brief description of proposed expenses, cost estimate(s) and proposed expenditures. Allowable costs for Infrastructure Projects shall include but not be limited to the cost of all materials, supplies, employee wages and benefits, equipment rental, and appropriate administrative overhead. If the project is undertaken by a contractor, the allowable costs will include the contractor's cost, plus the cost of related professional services, plus any labor, equipment, supplies, or supervision contributed by the Village. The County Executive or her designee, shall have the authority to approve or disapprove any such plans; however, in the event the County shall disapprove any such plans, the County shall endeavor to assist the Village in making any revisions to such proposal(s) to comport with the intent of this Agreement and Resolution No. 84-2010. Upon approval of submitted Infrastructure Plans, the County will authorize payment of grant funds in accordance with the terms of this Agreement.

c. Annual Report

The Village shall provide to the County Chief Fiscal Officer an Annual Report within ninety days of the end of each Village fiscal year. Such Annual Report shall include a detail of expenses paid for with Infrastructure Grant funds, a list of all executed and outstanding contracts for use of such funds, any amounts that remain due and owing under such contracts, an estimate of any amounts needed to complete any work contemplated hereunder, and the amount of any Infrastructure Grant funds being held by the Village as provided for in this Agreement.

d. Capital Reserve Fund Permitted

The Village may choose to set aside Infrastructure Grant funds in a dedicated capital reserve account for the purpose of accumulating adequate funding to undertake an approved Infrastructure Project in a subsequent year, provided that such is noted in the Annual Report.

e. Additional Information and Audit

The County reserves the right to request additional information from the Village regarding any Infrastructure Project and Infrastructure Grant usage and further reserves the right to audit at County expense any and all documents, data, or information related to this Agreement. The Village agrees to cooperate fully in any such request or audit.

REMEDIES

The County reserves the right to take any action and pursue all remedies to enforce this Agreement at law or in equity, and shall have the right to withhold any payments until such time as the Village complies with the terms of this Agreement. The Village agrees not to bring an action against the County with respect to the design and construction of improvements made with any funding provided under this Agreement, and the Village hereby agrees to hold harmless, defend and indemnify the County for any claims brought against the County related to this Agreement and the Infrastructure Projects provided for in this Agreement.

CONTRACT MODIFICATIONS

This Agreement represents the entire and integrated agreement between the County and the Village and supersedes all prior negotiations, representations or agreements either written or oral. This Agreement may be amended only by written instrument signed by both the County and the Village.

SEVERABILITY

If any term or provision of this Agreement shall be held invalid or unenforceable, the remainder of this Agreement shall not be affected thereby and every other term and provision of this Agreement shall be valid and enforced to the fullest extent permitted by law.

CLAUSES REQUIRED BY LAW

The parties hereto understand and agree that each and every provision of law and clause required by law to be inserted in this Agreement shall be deemed to have been inserted herein, and if through mistake or inadvertence such provision is not inserted, said clause shall be deemed to have been inserted and shall have the full force and effect of law.

MISCELLANEOUS

Any subsection titles contained herein are for reference and for the parties' convenience, and such titles do not constitute or in any way alter a term or condition of this Agreement.

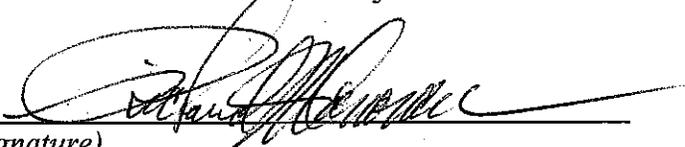
STATEMENT OF PRINCIPLES
